
Prayer For Our Parish

This sacrament is held on Saturdays at 3pm (St. Augustine's Church). Daily (Monday - Friday) 8:30am to 9am at (St. Elizabeth's Church).

Anointing of the Sick

This is a sacrament of healing. Do not hesitate to call the office if you or a member of your family wishes to receive this sacrament in your home, at the hospital or nursing home.

Care of the Sick or Homebound

Please notify the Parish Office when you or a member of your family is unable to attend Mass and would like to receive the Sacrament of the Sick or Holy Eucharist.

Hospital Visitation

If you are a patient in the hospital and wish to be visited and/or receive Communion or the Anointing of the Sick, you must inform the hospital of your wishes. You or a family member must request a chaplain visit or we cannot visit you.

Marriage

Please make arrangements at least one year in advance by calling the Parish Office.

Marriage Preparation
In the Diocese of Fall River, Marriage Preparation includes 1) an initial meeting with the priest who is preparing you for Marriage (fill out pre-marital investigation forms), 2) Obtain new copies of Sacramental Certificates, 3) get letter of delegation from your home parish 4) have priest obtain any dispensations needed from that Diocese 5) the FOCCUS profile, 6) Register for Pre-Cana, 7) the FOCCUS evaluation, 8) Attend Pre-Cana (Certificate of Completion, 9) Plan Wedding Liturgy (Together For Life), 10) Last visit with priest, 11) Rehearsal (Present marriage license and 12) Your Wedding. Since the Island is a very popular place for weddings, we need to schedule a date at least a year in advance to avoid being disappointed and then begin the preparation process 8 months in advance. Sunday, March 10, 2024 Fourth Sunday of Lent

Gospel: (John 3:16-21)

[Jesus said to Nicodemus:]

For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him. Whoever believes in him will not be condemned, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God. And this is the verdict, that the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light, because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed. But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in

Reflection

Nicodemus is a Pharisee. Although Nicodemus confesses his faith in Jesus, he comes to Jesus under the cover of darkness. Perhaps he does not want anyone to see him, for fear that he would be associated with Jesus. Jesus challenges him with an analogy of light and darkness. Although Nicodemus' words state that he believes Jesus is the Son of God, he hides his faith in the darkness. We are all called to be children of the light. Let us ask ourselves to think of a time when we kept our faith "under the cover of darkness" and reflect on why we felt the need to hide our faith. How might we grow in our ability to share our faith.

Why is it important to go to Mass? The Eucharist is the supreme act of worshiping God because it is Christ offering Himself to the Father on our behalf. It is the sacrifice at Calvary 2,000 years ago made present here and now. By participating at Mass, we make Christ's sacrifice our own and receive the grace of salvation anew. When we receive the Eucharist, we receive Jesus Himself. We also have an obligation to worship the Creator. It would be an insult to receive all the gifts we have received from God (our eyesight, our health, nice home, etc.) and then give Him nothing in return.

Here's an analogy: Let's say God gave a man \$168 dollars to live on each week. The man had to pay \$56 in rent and \$56 for food and living expenses. The remaining \$56 would be his to spend in any way. Then lets say that God asked for just \$1 of the remaining \$56. Wouldn't it be really selfish if the poor man said "no" to giving God the \$1 He requested?

Well, God gives us 168 hours of life each week. We have to go to school or work for approximately 56 hours each week, and we have to sleep another 56 hours. But then we have 56 hours to do whatever we want! Isn't it selfish if we will not give Him at least one hour of worship each week?

"First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people."

~1 Timothy 2:1

Wednesday, February 14, began another Lenten season and how appropriate it should begin on a day associated with love. No act in history showed greater love for another as Jesus' dying upon the Cross for the salvation of our souls. As we read in St. John's Gospel, "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends." (15:13).

Every Lent we are encouraged to participate in some way in the three tenets of Lent - prayer, fasting, and almsgiving (charity). St. Paul reminds us of the important role God has placed upon prayer in the life of the faithful. "I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy, because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now" (Philippians 1:3–5).

This year I would like to propose something that gives those acts even more meaning this Lent. What if we each choose three special intentions for which every prayer, every sacrifice, and every act of charity was offered.

Imagine the fruit of these 40-plus days if we focused our attention upon those things we most desire for our family, our community, our nation, or even our world! I recommend writing down your three most important intentions, and each day spending time in prayer with the Lord asking for His graces in each situation or circumstance.

Again, I draw inspiration and encouragement for my Lenten message from St. Paul, who writes, "we have not ceased to pray for you, asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of his will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so as to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God" (Colossians 1:9–10).

As you proceed throughout your day, as you help others, as you pray, or abstain from either meat or whatever penitential offering you are making this Lent, do so purposely attaching your prayer, your sacrifice, your penance, your act of charity for those intentions. Ask the Lord to take any merit or grace found in these Lenten moments toward your three special intentions.

Remember, there is no greater love we can show others by denying our own needs and desires, and offering our work, sacrifices, prayer, and charity for the good of another. Turning once more to leave you with the wisdom of St. Paul, "We give thanks to God always for all of you, constantly mentioning you in our prayers, remembering before our God and Father your work of faith and labor of love and steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ." (1 Thessalonians 1:2–3)

May your 2024 Lent be like no other as you journey thorough these 40 days with prayerful purpose and renewed hope. Please know my prayers are with you all.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Religious Formation for children ages 3-12

For God so loved the world that He gave His Only Son: "Love one another as I have loved you." by Father Hugh Barbour, https://www.catholic.com/magazine/online-edition/the-true-meaning-of-that-famous-verse

This is certainly the most cited verse of the New Testament in current American culture: on posters held up from the crowd at sporting events, on the bottom rim of In-N-Out Burger drinking cups, on the eye-black of Tim Tebow, and for the ladies, on the shopping bags of Forever 21. One finds it on bracelets, posters, country road signs, all over. More authoritatively, the words are now part of the rite of the Mass in the form of the Roman Rite approved under Pope Benedict for the communities of the Anglican Ordinariate, as part of the so-called "comfortable words" spoken by the priest or deacon in connection with the general confession of sins. Most Christians, one can safely suppose, whether Catholic or not, can recite at least this verse of Scripture, even if they know no other by heart.

What is the deepest meaning of these words, which can explain their intuitive attractiveness to Christians? Let's consider first of all that in our religion, which is that of Jesus Christ, we are commanded to love God with our whole heart, soul, mind, and strength, and we are told that loving our neighbor as ourselves is a commandment just like the first: the love of God. This is so true that Our Lord sums up both commandments of love in one commandment, which he calls a "new commandment": *Love one another as I have loved you*.

How does God love us? Well, he is the very source and model of the commandment of love. This means that God loves us as he loves himself. He would not give us, who are made in his image and likeness, this commandment of love, if he himself did not exemplify it. After all, St. John the beloved disciple tells us that "God is love."

So how does God love himself? By the procession of his only Son, and of their Holy Spirit in an infinite communion of love called the Blessed Trinity. This supreme goodness and life and beauty has chosen to share that infinite life with angels and men. So when we say that God so loved the world that he gave his only Son so that everyone who believes in him might not perish, but might have eternal life, we mean that God loves us as he loves himself, with the love of the Father for the Son, which is their Holy Spirit. In this sense, then, God models the fulfillment of this commandment of love of God and neighbor by giving us himself in the Holy Trinity as our life and happiness, that is, by loving us as he loves himself.

Now this is a very deep reality, and it tells us about how we are to love our neighbor. We love our neighbor, as Christians, not only as one for whom we need to observe the Golden Rule, although that is a start, but precisely as one who is, like us, made in the image and likeness of God. We love our neighbor in imitation, in participation of the mysterious community life of God who is Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

This reality gives our loving intentions and actions a power greater than any other in the whole world. It is why St. Paul tells us that, unless we have the love of God in us, all our best qualities and virtues are nothing, and that this love never fails, even though heaven and earth will pass away. Love is what had made us and what keeps us in being and will ultimately save us. This is because it is the very life of God, and our very mysterious destiny in him, who, in the words of St. Paul in today's second reading, has prepared for us—from all eternity—such good works as we are to walk in on the way to eternal life.

What this share in eternal life will be is utterly beyond our present knowledge. Paul tells us that we are God's children now, but what we will later come to be, has not yet come to light. When it does, we will know God, as now we are known by him, he tells us. This has something to do with God's knowing us and loving us as he knows and loves himself.

This love is the source of the great security and consolation that so many have intuitively experienced over the centuries in hearing these "comfortable words" of the Savior. As the apostle says, "If God is for us, who can be against us?" If he did not spare his only Son for our sake, will he not give us all good things, namely himself?

In short, we belong to God, we are the effect of his love, and not just of a love for his creatures as lesser beings, but of his love for himself, which is himself. This is not pantheism or Gnosticism or New Age ideology. The fact is that the mysterious way in which God in the Holy Trinity identifies himself with us is far sweeter, and more powerful, and more profound, and more precious to him than it ever could be to us. And whatever it is it will make pantheism seem like some weak conception. That is why God came, taking our very nature so as to become, not only our God, but in the same divine Person the first of our neighbors, and indeed, "the firstborn of all creation."

So let everybody who knows you, know also that you are convinced that there is nothing more secure and more real and more powerful than the love of the Father in Christ Jesus. And see to it by your loving deeds that you have begun to understand just a little bit what it means when we say, "God so loved the world..."

If you have not yet taken the opportunity, please take a prayer card for a child and his/her family preparing for the Sacraments of First Reconciliation and Eucharist this spring.

Cards are located in small baskets at the entrances to both St. Augustine and St. Elizabeth Churches. Pray, fast, and give alms for our Confirmation students who will be confirmed on April 28th.



While the Gospel has not preserved any of his words, his actions have resounded through the ages.
